Focus Healthy work

Healthy? It pays to stay safe! No project is worth risking your health.

ou've just finished the workday and then you notice it: an annoying little detail that you would rather just cut away or sand off. Your tool is still at hand, but your work gloves and safety glasses have already been tidied away. It's a typical scenario where for one brief moment you put your health at risk. After all, it's only a quick little job. It's a hassle to pull out your safety

equipment again. And plus, experienced craftsmen are all doing it this way. All of these three arguments fall flat when a chip flies into your eye or your thumb gets cut.

Health and safety awareness in the workplace is a tedious but highly relevant topic – especially in small companies. The numbers confirm it: according to the European Agency for Safety and Health at Work (EU-OSHA), health and safety approaches in the workplace are 'often inadequate' and staff in micro and small businesses are at higher risk of work-related accidents and illnesses. The consequences are clear – after all, even just one accident can bring the entire business to a halt. It sounds drastic, but that is reality.

Three experts who know the score

Alexander Hoste, Rolf Stelzle and Philipp Stahl know what's really happening in painting companies. As an occupational health and safety expert, Hoste visits lots of businesses. Stelzle is the owner of a painting company that employs 10 people. And Stahl, himself a master painter, works as an application technician at Festool, looking for ways his company can help painters improve the health, safety and cleanliness of their work as best as possible. The three experts are in absolute agreement that businesses have to be proactive when it comes to health and safety. Just how to get them to do that is up for friendly debate: Through strict rules and tight controls? Hardly. With good old common sense? That's better. Through cost-effectiveness analyses and profitability calculations? One or the other may well be persuaded that way.



Philipp Stahl completed his training as a painter in 1999–2002 and passed his master painter examination in 2008. He worked in his father's company, where he gradually took over the reins and eventually became the director. He has been a Festool application technician since September 2017.

> Rolf Stelzle is a master painter. He founded his own company in Backnang in 1990. He was an active member of the Rems-Murr painters' guild leadership for years and worked with colleagues to launch the 'Design Maler' initiative. The fact that he values health and safety in the workplace so much is a reflection of his great appreciation for his employees.

Safe and healthy work starts with the right protective work gear.



Safety glasses offer the perfect view while protecting your eyes from dust particles, chips or liquid spray of all types. Wearing safety glasses is strongly recommended especially when sanding and painting overhead.



prevent dust or aerosols from getting into your airways during sanding or painting. Half masks with FFP filters are recommended, which protect against inert dust (FFP1), harmful particles

(FFP2) and toxic emissions (FFP3).





Work gloves

protect your most important tool: your hands. They come in a range of materials, such as cotton, leather, PVC and nitrile. They should be cut, tear and puncture-resistant. Installation gloves are more flexible and have a better grip, so you can keep a firm grasp of your tool.



Safety shoes are indispensable on the building site. Safety shoes have toe caps (protection class 1), are waterproof (protection class 2) and also have a puncture-resistant sole (protection class 3).

Health protection pays off

In small companies, any injury or illness can have unforeseeable consequences.



ure, health protection costs money. And no, this investment does not immediately improve earnings. But for Alexander Hoste, it's clear: 'Every euro invested in health and safety in the workplace pays off double. In small companies in particular, injuries and illnesses can represent existential threats.'

Rolf Stelzle nods in agreement. If one of his employees calls in sick, he can still power through with the rest of his team. But if a second one becomes incapacitated, he's already lost 20% of his working capacity. That's why he prioritises the health and safety of his employees.

Healthy, safe and simply a matter of course

'Having healthy employees is the basic prerequisite for running a healthy business,' Stelzle says. 'That's why health and safety in the workplace should be simply a matter of course, so much a part of the standard operating procedure that you don't even have to think about it.' His company does not have a health and safety manager, like the bigger operations have. As the company owner, he himself plays that role. 'The nice thing about it is that our employees themselves greatly value healthy work,' Stelze explains. 'They don't sand without dust masks. They never leave the building without a dust extraction system. They always strap up when working at dangerous heights. And they are proactive about talking to me when they need something.'

'That is exemplary, but it is more an exception than the rule,' says Philipp Stahl, who himself worked as a master painter for several years. 'In many cases, health protection falls flat as soon as the question of who pays for what arises.' Employees sometimes have to pay for their protective gear themselves. And if an apprentice has been sanding three days straight without vibration protection and his forearm is still buzzing as he lay in bed at night, he's told: 'Stop whining. We need tough guys on the building site, guys who can take a beating!'

orkers in the construction industry are known to be one of the professional groups most at risk. But that does not mean that increased 'occupational risk' is a necessary evil and these workers just have to hope that nothing goes wrong. Health

protection calls for a recognition that no one is bulletproof – anyone can be injured on the job. And it is worth paying attention to, because it pays off in the long run.

'I know what it's like, when you just want to grab your tool and quickly do a small job without bothering with protection. That's when the worst accidents happen. You should always take time to look after your own health and safety,' Philipp Stahl advises. Naturally painting companies are under enormous time pressure on the job. But honestly, 'it doesn't take much to protect yourself or give employees appropriate training.' It's easy to adopt the right attitude when lifting or carrying heavy objects. Dust masks and safety glasses have become so comfortable that they are hardly a bother. 'Efficient dust extraction,' Stahl emphasises, 'is so quick and easy to set up that you can get on with your work straight away.'

Work healthy and stay healthy long-term

So what's the catch? The three men exchange inquisitive glances – and come to the unanimous conclusion that there actually is no catch. And how do you get small companies to be more proactive when it comes to health and safety in the workplace? 'I think you have to make it clear that it is not just about rules and regulations that someone just thought up on a whim – it's about people,' Rolf Stelzle explains. 'My employees are my most important asset. Without them, I would have to shut down operations. That's why it's important to me that they work healthy and stay healthy long-term.'



very trade has its own light and dark sides. Literally so in the painting industry: working on a cloudy day without adequate lighting can be fatal. Take sanding, for example. You spend all that time working on a wall or ceiling – and the next day a bright stream of light comes in through the window and reveals the results of

your labour. Often what comes next are curses, grumbling and then reworking the area.

With the new PLANEX, Festool is finally shining a light on this dark side of painting. Some are even saying that the long-reach sander is itself a light. Others prize its special sanding qualities. But everyone loves it for making work extremely easier thanks to its vacuum suction power. And everyone is right. But first things first.

Optimal illumination during sanding

The new PLANEX LHS 2 225 has an all-round LED light ring on the sanding pad that throws a circular crown of light onto the wall, right at the point where you are working. An integrated light on the sanding pad? It's inconceivable – but possible thanks to modern LED technology, because it brings light where incandescent bulbs and other lamps would never have been able to before. That's exactly what our brightest minds at Festool took to heart and implemented in the development of the new PLANEX. Light makes it even better

Festool's harshest critics work with Festool. We asked Johann Schlosser for his thoughts on the new PLANEX LHS 2 225.



Johann Schlosser knows his craft. The master painter joined Festool more than ten years ago, and has been with Application Technology since 2013. Full of passion and commitment to his work, he aims to impress customers with Festool tools. It's not a difficult task for him, only because he is so unabashedly impressed by the tools himself.

FM: The new PLANEX long-reach sander is a true highlight. What do you think of it, as a master painter and

application technician? JS: When we were developing the new PLANEX, we implemented an unbelievable amount of ideas in detail and in a system. And we did it really without compromising. You notice that when you work with the new PLANEX, and you see it in the sanding results.

FM: And you literally do see a lot more when working with the new PLANEX, isn't that right?

JS: Exactly right. The first time you see it in action, you might think, wow, that looks cool; what a great lighting effect! But the LED light ring on the sanding pad is much more than just an effect. It actually works like an integrated grazing light, making defects and unevenness visible. As a result, you can check the surface quality directly as you sand. And you save valuable time since you don't have to do tedious reworking or set up lots of different light sources.

FM: What else makes the new long-reach sander stand out?

JS: You notice that it's easier to guide the PLANEX over the surface thanks to the eccentric sanding motion. We also significantly improved the suction power with an optimised suction channel and the finer hole pattern of the new 225 abrasive. This makes the job easier for painters and also produces even better sanding results. If you're sanding large areas of high walls and ceilings, you know how important that is.

FM: What are you especially impressed with?

JS: What always impress me are the many details that work together perfectly in a Festool system: the sander, abrasive and dust extractor are perfectly coordinated with each other. I can transport the long-reach sander easily in a Systainer, and the PLANEX is really quick and easy to put together and start using in just a few motions. The T-handle is relatively inconspicuous, but it allows me to sand walls up to 2.50 metres high with the new PLANEX without an extension. What is crucial is the fact that our tools offer craftspeople ideal support. And the new PLANEX does that excellently!







DUST-FREE WORK WITH A SYSTEM





uring refurbishment, where stubborn plaster, old paint or tiling adhesive has to be removed with refurbishment routers and diamond grinders, the amount of material being taken off is enormous. And the risk posed by the dust released in the process is significant. In these types of situations when the going gets tough, the new CLEANTEC CT 36 E AC RENOFIX is in its element. It comes with approval for dust category L or M and is available as a 36 litre model or as a more compact model with a 26 litre capacity.

The Chinese metropolis of Qingdao has a colour in its name, one that is difficult to accurately describe: 'Qing' is turquoise, blue-green or perhaps more green-blue, depending on your perspective. And the architects from Crossboundaries in Qingdao have shown how to derive an amazing colour scheme from this for a children's centre.

China. on the coast of the Yellow Sea. Once a fishing village, this metropolis has since grown to a population of more than four million residents. It is home to the famous beer of the local Tsingtao brewery, which was founded in 1903 during German colonialism and is today one of the largest breweries in the world. Nestled among modern skyscrapers and shopping centres in Qingdao are, interestingly, one or the other German-style half-timbered buildings. So when a German architect and her team come here to design and build a project, it doesn't seem that strange, somehow. For Binke Lenhardt, who has been living in Beijing for 18 years, it's practically a hometown project. She and her partner Hao Dong founded the architectural firm Crossboundaries in 2005.

Playing and learning in colour


The fact that these two architects work 'across boundaries' is not just because of their different backgrounds. It is also a reflection of their consistent efforts to think outside the box and find unexpected architectural solutions for every building project. Take the Family Box Qingdao, for example: a type of children's nursery which the architects from Crossboundaries created in part of a shopping centre. The 4,400 square metres spread over two floors house open classrooms, play areas, a café and even a swimming pool.

'We tried to eliminate the classic separation of learning and playing, in order to incorporate a different type of learning through play in our architecture,' Binke Lenhardt explains. The concept includes 'Smart Spaces', which can be opened or closed as needed with the help of mobile walls. The 'Smart Volumes' are noteworthy, making use of expanded depths in the walls as climbing areas, caves or passageways. Zones with sometimes reduced ceiling heights offer the kids spaces to play alone or with others; foam surfaces and cushioned mushroom heads invite them to run around and enjoy themselves.







Colourful, healthy and sustainable

The punchy colours running through the children's centre catch your eye first. 'It's not just nice because it's colourful,' emphasises Binke Lenhardt. 'Our colour scheme is reduced to three key colours, which have a local importance and also impart a feel-good effect.' Blue, green and yellow – the city colours of Qingdao – are used in different shades on the walls, ceilings and floors. The 'Smart Volumes' are green; the bright turquoise on the walls and the graded orange of the linoleum floors establish the connection between the sea and its sandy beaches.

Execution of the work on the building site was always at the forefront of the architects' minds, of course. One employee was on site for three months during the execution phase. Since China has a long tradition of craftsmanship but no traditional guilds, the architects worked with craftspeople they already knew and could trust with their high standards where possible. An important aspect of the Family Box was the use of safe materials. For example, the walls and ceilings were primarily painted with water-based paint. The quality of the linoleum floors also played an important role, because children naturally spend a lot of time sitting on the floor. 'Ultimately,' Binke Lenhardt emphasises, 'it is always about not just impressing our clients with architectural ideas but also making a mark when it comes to healthy and sustainable building.'

Expertise Filling and sanding drywall

FILLING AND SANDING DRYWALL

If you ask a painter how to achieve clean drywall and what materials and tools to use for the best result, there's really only one serious answer: it depends! We have tried to shed a little light on this topic.

In drywall construction, filling and sanding are standard procedures. That said, when you look at everything involved in achieving a clean and perfect surface, these tasks are anything but ordinary. It comes down to the details, bringing them together into a coordinated overall package. After all, fillers from different manufacturers have different properties and should be worked on and sanded with the right tools.

FILLING

Drywall construction involves gypsum boards with different types of edges. The most common are boards with half-rounded tapered longitudinal edges and bevelled cut edges. With supporting materials such as timber posts or derived timber boards, hygrothermal tension occurs in the substrate which can lead to the formation of cracks in the filling. To achieve a stable, long-lasting result in both cases, it is a good idea to use filler materials with especially high joint stability and to use reinforcing or joint tape strips.

FILLERS

- > Filler putty is specially designed for filling joints with joint tape.
- > With joint filler, plasterboard joints are filled without joint tape.
- > Fine filler is used to 'finish' filler putty or joint filler; it forms the finished surface of the joint.

TYPES OF FILLER

- > Gypsum-bonded fillers are available as bagged goods in powder form. A compact crystal structure forms as it sets, and the filler achieves very high joint stability. Application: joint filling for plasterboard (Q1 and Q2) and full-
- surface filling with higher layer thicknesses. > Plastic-based fillers are available ready-mixed in buckets. They air dry. Depending on the product and application, the filler needs to be stirred before use.

Application: full-surface filling of plasterboard (Q3 and Q4), thin reworking of old plaster or concrete surfaces.

The new PLANEX 2 225 long-reach sander is perfect for full-surface and flat sanding. The LED grazing light on the sanding pad achieves surfaces of the highest quality. The Granat and Granat Net abrasives are ideal for perfect sanding results.

hen people in Backnang say that Stelzle is crazy, they don't mean it in a negative way. And Rolf Stelzle doesn't take it the wrong way. He just smiles and accepts it as the highest form of praise and recognition. He knows his people, and they know

him. This year his painting company celebrates 30 years of business. He looks younger than his more than 60 years. When Rolf Stelzle talks about his profession and his life, his passionate enthusiasm twinkles in his eyes. Stelzle sparkles with the ideas he concocts with his employees. He lives as if every day were his last, and every new job the most amazing.

In 1990 when it all began, Rolf Stelzle set off independently and built up his own company in Backnang, half an hour's drive north-east of Stuttgart. He took care of the painting, and his wife Isolde took care of the business. Stelzle still remembers his first bumpy job like it was yesterday: 'I was to prepare and paint the shutters of a kindergarten. Of course, I completely miscalculated it and there was way more work to do than I originally thought. I also didn't label the shutters, so once everything was actually finished, it took me two days to figure out which shutters went back where. Right from the start I learned the hard way that experience is a great teacher.'

Appreciation for the painter and the business

Rolf Stelzle can laugh about it now. In the past three decades he has built a successful company with 10 employees. He's in a position to pick and choose the jobs these days: high-end surfaces in a villa, refurbishing a half-timbered facade on a listed building, fancy textured wallpaper in a bathroom or a suspended ceiling with integrated speakers. 'In most cases we deal with private individuals, which is why direct contact with the customer is extremely important. I spend a lot of time on it.' The skilled painter focuses not on just doing any old thing; instead he always tries to find out what is important to the customer and work out what he thinks is possible. 'Intensive advice and excellent execution go hand in hand with us,' Stelzle emphasises. 'Everything depends on that. After all, we want the customer to appreciate our work and not just here and now but also ten or twenty years down the road.'

Rolf Stelzle is extremely well connected, having been an active member of the Rems-Murr painters' guild leadership for years. And because he is constantly driven by and thinking about knowledge and expertise in the painting trade, he worked with colleagues to launch the 'Design Maler' initiative, where extraordinary and especially striking painting solutions are shared even today. Stelzle is a painter in high demand and is also valued as an expert in technical matters. This has contributed significantly to the good reputation his company has enjoyed for three decades.

Origin and future of the family company

Without his wife - the actual 'soul' of the company, he says he would not have achieved all this. She has been there in good times and bad. And Stelzle does much to ensure that his employees receive credit for their craftsmanship, too: with lots of praise and recognition and an excellent salary. He passes on his passion for experimentation and his curiosity for trying something new to his employees and to his son Noah, who is currently preparing to undergo his examination to become a master painter. In the workshop they are constantly testing new materials, painting techniques and machines, discovering which methods produce the desired results. The high shelves in the workshop hold a wide range of painting materials and tools, and even his grandfather's ancient brushes and graining combs are still in use. And somewhere in the workshop there is still an aged vessel of linseed oil that Stelzle guards like a treasure.

It's a piece of the past that holds firmly onto a place in the Backnang painting company today. Stelzle knows where he comes from and has never lost traction, even as he forges ambitious plans with his son. They've erected a new, modern workshop with a solar roof on the other end of the city, where Noah Stelzle will come up with his own ideas in future: new ideas, different ideas, all sprinkled with a little bit of magic. Someday, in 30 years or so, when people say that Stelzle is crazy, Noah will know that he's done everything right.


The historical town centre of Backnang is home to countless half-timbered buildings in a wide spectrum of colour. Maintaining these buildings is one of the most demanding jobs of a painter. Where masonry, plaster and wood meet come forces that are hard to keep under control.

Text: Ralf Christofori Photography: Torben Jäger, Rolf Stelzle he German Timber-Frame Road is famous. It stretches from Lake Constance to the River Elbe. If along the way you stop in Backnang, you will find half-timbered buildings that are over three hundred years old. They still shape the look of the former weaving and tannery town today. Painter Rolf Stelzle, who is based there, takes us on a tour through the town's historical centre and points out the facades to his left and his right that he has dedicated hours of work to refurbishing in past years. The timber frames are red or yellow, turquoise or blue. Sometimes the panels themselves are even painted in colour.

Half-timbered buildings require true craftsmanship

It's a beautiful sight, but it takes an enormous amount of work to maintain the facades. 'You have to know the material and above all, you have to be able to do your craft well, if you want to refurbish half-timbered facades properly and preserve them for the future,' Rolf Stelzle says. 'Superficial patchwork won't get you far.' It's a daunting task, with constant challenges for the master painter: warped beams, rotten posts, heavily weathered panels – buildings that hardly know a right angle and have adopted a lean over the centuries. This is where true craftsmanship is required.

Rolf Stelzle, master painter

Rolf Stelzle shows us the Limpurg, a building he refurbished in the summer of 2017. The half-timbered building from 1899 may look like a castle but is actually a superb landmark building with finely executed gables, topped with a protruding regal tower. Damaged areas in the wood were carefully smoothed, the shingles in the wooden grooves of the tower were treated and replaced where necessary. On the panels, Stelzle's team removed andrenewed the plaster and then painted it in a pink shade.

Clean work with the right material

'The main difficulty with half-timbered buildings is that all the materials you use have to be elastic. Because when the wood shifts, then inevitably the masonry and plaster in the panels are also affected,' explains Stelzle. That's why he instructed his employees to always carefully mask out the wooden struts and beams when painting the panels. They used waterbased oil paint for the wood itself, which has high elasticity and also ensures that the wood can breathe. 'The worst thing you can do to wood is cover it in plastic-based paint, which would essentially seal it. Then the wood literally rots underneath the paint.'

Rolf Stelzle looks proudly at the Limpurg and is very happy with the result. And he should be. After all, three years after refurbishment the facade still looks as fresh as if the painter had only yesterdayremoved the scaffolding.




